

The AIS was pleased to be able to donate new blankets to those in need in Amroha during the cold winter months earlier this year and plan to do so again in December.



EDITOR'S NOTE

The last six months have seen the AIS increase the eye camps from three to four due to the generosity of donors. We have also been able to provide a larger number of scholarships to talented students from underprivileged families. Further, we implemented a computer training course in April, which, due to its success, will be provided again in October.

Our eye camps continue to attract over 500 patients. A new record of 650 attendees was established for the eye camp on 23 January. On average, over 40 people who attend each cataract camp have a cataract operation.

Video footage of the eye camp I attended last November is on the AIS website and on YouTube. I am looking forward to attending the next eye camp on 31 October.

With regard to the AIS scholarship programme, our advertisements in Hindi and Urdu newspapers in Amroha were successful in attracting a larger number of applicants. Due to increased funding, the AIS was able to increase the number of scholarships to those students who otherwise would be unable to go to colleges or universities outside Amroha. The AIS has continued to offer scholarships to students at the AMU and JMI. As part of the qualifying criteria, it is expected that our scholarship holders will actively assist the AIS to help the disadvantaged people of Amroha.

The AIS is excited about commencing the computer training course leading to a diploma certificate, thus facilitating successful students to gain employment.

The "Clean Amroha" project has been evolving. We now have a subcommittee, chaired by Afzal Suri. This committee is meeting regularly to plan the program. To date, the committee has appointed nine captains of mohallas (suburbs).

The captains lead a team to coordinate the cleaning of their own mohalla. The cleanest mohalla will be awarded a perpetual shield in November during my stay in Amroha and the name of the winning mohalla for 2014 will be the first to be engraved. This will hopefully spur other mohalla captains to do their best to have their mohalla's name engraved in forthcoming years.

The AIS is also planning a "Clean Amroha Day" during my stay where college students will be asked to clean the area near their college. The AIS thanks Dr Afsar Pervez, Chairman, Nagar Palika (Council) for his cooperation on this initiative.

As winter comes upon Amroha, the AIS will distribute blankets to those in need.

AIS Cataract Camps

Due to demand the AIS increased the number of eye camps from 3 to 4 this year. The next eye camps in 2014 are on 29 August and 31 October.

Eye Camp, 23 January 2014

All previous records for the number of attendees for AIS eye camps were broken in the eye camp of 23 January as 650 patients registered - the highest number ever.

Of these patients, 42 were taken to the Venu Eye Institute in New Delhi for cataract operations while 220 people were given free spectacles and 225 were given free medication for other eye problems.

Eye Camp, 23 April 2014

The camp in April was attended by 550 patients. Of these, 43 were taken to New Delhi for cataract operations, 220 were given free spectacles and 228 were given free medicine for other eye deceases. Unfortunately, 200 more people who queued for an eye examination were not examined due to time restraints on the part of the doctors. We are talking to the Venu Eye Institute to try to rectify this problem.

The Clean Amroha Project

Many World Health Organization **(WHO)** studies have shown that a clean environment is critical to facilitate better health. It is for this reason our Clean Amroha Project was launched by Dr Afsar Pervez, Chairman, Amroha Nagar Palika (Council) last year.

To begin the project, **rubbish bins** were put around Amroha. However, unfortunately, most bins were stolen, so other strategies to clean up Amroha are clearly needed.

(Let us also hope that the nicked bins are being put to good use!)

Other initiatives included a Drawing Competition in the R.K. College coordinated by Dr Abbas Khan as reported in the last newsletter. This project, in which children are encouraged to not only demonstrate their creative skills but also to raise public awareness of the importance of keeping their environment clean, will be be expanded to involve other schools and colleges in Amroha on 19 August.

A committee chaired by Afzal Ali has commenced an education program by appointing captains of nineteen *mohallas*. This committee intends to announce a 'Clean Amroha Day'.

Although the committee members are men, it is pleasing to note that college girls are showing great enthusiasm for the project!

Zahid will work in cooperation with Faisal Abidi of New Delhi. Faisal will help Zahid to make the website's presentation both attractive and user-friendly.


